Forest Weekend Program and Schedule

Peter O'Reilly Senior - Host - Peter is a second-generation family member who grew up at O'Reillys and later with brother Vince managed the guesthouse operations for 40 years. He has a vast knowledge of the plants and wildlife of Lamington National Park and will be attending and supporting the weekend program and Birdweek.

Dr Bill McDonald - Leader - Bill is an Honorary Research Associate at the Queensland Herbarium, where he spent most of his career before retiring in 2012. One of his first tasks was to survey and map the plant communities of the Gold Coast hinterland, which led to a lifelong interest in rainforest floristics and ecology. He has co-authored a series of publications on rainforest plant identification, culminating in the production of a digital interactive key to trees, shrubs and climbers of eastern Australian rainforests. He hopes to provide a deeper understanding of the plant and animal habitats of Lamington National Park and adjacent World Heritage reserves.

Paula Peeters - Leader - Paula uses imagination, first-hand observations and scientific knowledge to create compelling stories and images of Australian nature. She is a writer, artist and ecologist based in Beechmont, Australia. Her childhood fascination with nature led to a PhD in botany, zoology and ecology. Paula then worked in wildlife conservation for 13 years, managing programs for a wide range of plants, animals and ecosystems in South Australia and Queensland.

Since 2015 Paula has focussed on writing, illustration and teaching nature journaling. She has created and self-published three colouring books (Bimblebox Wonderland, Riverina Grassland Ramblings, and The Southern Bell Frog Story), two books about nature journaling (Make a Date with Nature and Take this Book for a Walk) and a work of fiction for children 8 – 12 years (Stories from the Wild World). Ray Carpenter - Guest Speaker - Ray has a PhD in Plant Science (Palaeobotany) from the University of Tasmania, and has published over 60 papers in scientific journals. He is interested in all aspects of ecosystem evolution in the Southern Hemisphere, and especially the importance of the leaf fossil record over the last 70 million years or so. He has worked on fossil assemblages from across Australia, and also in New Zealand and Patagonia. His focus has been on the iconic family Proteaceae (especially Banksia), but he has also described fossils from a number of other Gondwanan lineages, including several that are still found in the rainforests of Lamington NP.
