Peter O'Reilly

As a second-generation O'Reilly family member, growing up at O'Reilly's and later managing the guesthouse operations with his brother Vince, Peter has a deep knowledge of the plants and wildlife of Lamington National Park. In 2002, Peter was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for his work with the Environment and Tourism.



Dr Bill McDonald Leader

Bill has a long history of research and exploration of Lamington National Park and hence has long been a part of O'Reilly's and National Park history stretching back several decades. He loves coming to the area as much as possible. Bill is a qualified zoologist and an Honorary Research Associate at the Queensland Herbarium and has had a long career both there and in the field.

He is a leading authority on flora and in particular the flora of South East Queensland and has co-authored several books and digital resources on the identification of rainforest plants. This has also led to his detailed knowledge of local wildlife. Bill and Peter O'Reilly have undertaken what is believed to be the longest continual rainforest research study in the world.

His expertise will broaden our understanding of the role of birds in the rainforest ecosystem and how they are related. Bill has birded, worked, and travelled comprehensively around Australia and across the globe. Bill has led numerous Forest Week and Forest Weekend events at O'Reilly's Rainforest Retreat.



Tim O'Reilly Host

A third-generation family member with over 21 years of guiding experience in Lamington. His qualifications include working at the guesthouse for over 20 years, managing the activities department, collating the Mammal Guide and Guide to Birds of Lamington booklets, and guiding international birders to the park and surrounds over many years.

Tim studied a double degree in Environmental Science and has been birding in Asia, Africa and the UK. Recently he has been involved in environmental programs through 'Wild Mob' and other environmental based organisations taking groups on conservation projects targeting threatened species recovery programs. He will be the main host, MC and leader checking final numbers for all tours during the week.



Dr Ian Gynther

Ian Gynther is a zoologist and works as a Principal Conservation Officer in the Threatened Species Unit of the Queensland Department of Environment, Science and Innovation. Ian is an expert on the vertebrate fauna of Australia but in particular Queensland.

Ian has been a leader in well over 20 Bird Weeks and has previously led Frog, Mammal and Wildlife Weeks. He is involved in fieldwork in Lamington National Park and across Queensland. Most recently, Ian co-edited the authoritative 'Strahan's Mammals of Australia', Fourth Edition, and has been regarded as knowing virtually everything that moves. Ian will be leading on most of the full day outings and facilitates the bird counts and record keeping register of Bird Week sightings.





Barry Davies
Leader

Barry Davies owns and operates Gondwana Guides and is one of Australia's most experienced guides and the only person to twice be named Australian EcoGuide of the Year by Ecotourism Australia.

He is based at Beechmont on the edge of World Heritagelisted Lamington National Park and provides a range of birding services in Australia and overseas. He has extensive knowledge of Lamington National Parks and surrounds.



Todd Burrows

Todd Burrows is an ecologist and wildlife photographer, with a special interest in birds. Since 2012, he has been with the City of Gold Coast as a Senior Conservation Partnerships Officer working with private landholders across the city to help conserve and enhance biodiversity. Prior to this, he worked for a decade as an Environment Guide at Couran Cove Island Resort on South Stradbroke Island and enjoyed leading the early morning bird walks.

Todd's interest in the bird life of Australia was sparked at a young age during family trips to O'Reilly's, which led to a passion for bird watching and wildlife photography. Todd's photos have been published in several magazines and field guides and appear on park signage throughout the Gold Coast and further afield. Todd is also a keen user of eBird and iNaturalist and volunteers as an eBird reviewer for the Gold Coast LGA.



Glen Threlfo

Glen started working at O'Reilly's in Bird Week 40 years ago with a bird call workshop and has been working for O'Reilly's as a guide ever since. He has attended nearly all of the Bird Weeks. Glen has an affection and intimate knowledge of the ecosystems of the Lamington region and is a good friend to all the birds close to the Guesthouse Retreat area!

He has produced numerous publications and documentaries that showcase the spectacular flora and fauna of the park. He has travelled and filmed far and wide, including much of Australia (particularly the Top End of the Northern Territory) but also Africa, India and Antarctica. Glen's recent work involves filming Peregrine Falcons nesting in Sydney and weaving a new documentary from his catalogue of amazing footage. We hope to see Glen's latest work this week!



Matthew Kelly

Matthew Kelly originated from the Northern Beaches of Sydney. He has worked as a guide in Waratah National Park near Sydney, Kakadu in the Northern Territory and El Questro in the Kimberley region of Western Australia. Matt first became a guide at O'Reilly's Rainforest Retreat in August 2010. His is part of the O'Reilly's Discovery Team as a part-time guide and is our resident e-Bike Guide. He also guides birding groups throughout the year.

Matt has been slowly discovering sites where our difficult-to-find rarer birds have been hiding out. This should be of interest during Bird Week.



Rahula Perera

Rahula Perera is a biologist from Sri Lanka. Currently working as a storyteller in Australia, he is a certified EcoGuide and accredited Savannah Guide in Australia. Rahula is a member of the Field Ornithology Group of Sri Lanka (local BirdLife International partner), which works closely with BirdLife Asia, and BirdLife International to promote and plan bird tourism in the region.

He has first-hand experience in studying mixed species foraging flocks in Gondwana rainforest in Sri Lanka, including lowland, sub-montane and montane forests, and through collaboration with the other scientists in the country has produced numerous scientific publications.


Professor James Watson

James Watson is a Professor of Conservation Science at The University of Queensland. He leads the Research and Recovery of **Endangered Species (RARES) Group** (www.rares.org.au) whose mission is to work with partners to do applied research that is linked directly to the practice of site-based conservation of Australia's rarest species. James founded the International Union of Nature Conservation Climate Change Specialist Group in 2012 and served on the United Nation's International Panel for Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) Data and Knowledge Task Force. He is a Research Fellow for the United Nation's Environment Program, a Senior Technical expert for the United Nations Development Program's Global Programme on Nature for Development. He was also the first Australian to be the global president of the Society of Conservation Biology.

Stockyard Creek track. Full day walk (mostly downhill!) 7-8km, 8hr. This track was the original access to O'Reilly's for guests and supplies. Steep edges, very loose underfoot, uneven terrain, medium-high fitness necessary. Lunch out and remember to take extra water. Top to bottom birding, seeking eucalypt forest birds such as Glossy Black-Cockatoo and lowland rainforest species such as White-eared Monarch and fruit-doves. Travel home by bus. Packed lunches.



Beaudesert- Western Lagoons and Kerry Valley bus trip. This full day tour targets lowland species in the farmland, parkland and drier woodland areas around Canungra and Beaudesert, as well as waterbirds at numerous dams in the area. Birding is from the bus and on short nearby walks. Packed lunches.

Bus drop off departs for (Upper) Cainbable Falls off-track walk. Take a trek along the old horse-riding route down to Cainbable Falls and take all day! Starting at Luke's Farm, we trek 4km down a Hoop Pine forest ridge to Cainbable Creek, which we follow down to Cainbable Falls. Next is a 2km gradual uphill journey to Duck Creek Road at Belson's Ridge for return vehicle transport. Drier rainforest, eucalypt and escarpment habitats will be encountered. Packed lunches, rough and slippery underfoot, with some steep sections, medium to high fitness and agility required.
